Current Status

- 100% direct cost recovery for all City programs.
- Partial cost recovery for special events.
 - Vendors and Exhibitor Fees
 - Sponsorships
- Recover direct cost for fields, facilities and picnic shelters.




- Serves as a tool for evaluating services and establishing appropriate fees.
- Standardizes how fees are set.
- Justifies/Validates costs for service.
- Oreates transparency and consistency in fees and charges for programs and services.
- Establishing a fee policy yields lasting benefits
 - Protects the taxpayers investment for optimal return
 - Allows prices to reflect users' investment in themselves based on individual benefit.
 - Promotes program respect and ownership



- <u>Equity</u>- Those who benefit from the service should pay for it. Those who benefit the most should pay the most.
- Value Provide the customer with a benefit in relation to or exceeding the relative monetary worth.
- Revenue Production- Producing revenue assists with services offered and offset impacts from use.
- <u>Efficiency</u>- Expenditures are made with the most efficient use of our resources, the right mix of programs, facilities and events.
- Revenue Distribution- Revenues are distributed to the cost center providing expenditures.
- Assistance Not all customers have the same ability to pay and opportunities must exist to waive, reduce or provide scholarship opportunities.

- 1. MOSTLY COMMUNITY BENEFIT: Available to everyone in the community, benefits everyone.
 - Parks and Facilities Maintenance
 - Trails
 - Special Events (No entry fee)
 - Unreserved picnic areas
 - Natural Areas Tres Rios
 - Playgrounds, dog parks, courts
 - Splash pad

Low or no cost Recovery (0%-15%), Full Subsidy





- 2. CONSIDERABLE COMMUNITY BENEFIT: Services benefit those who participate but also the community at large.
 - Youth Recreation Programs
 - Senior Recreation Programs
 - Drop in Recreation Programs
 - Aquatics

Partial cost recovery (16%-50%); Mostly Subsidized





- 3. INDIVIDUAL/ COMMUNITY BENEFIT: User fees should recover the full cost of services.
 - Resident Athletic Field Rentals
 - Non-Profit Athletic Field Rentals
 - Non-Profit Special Event Facility Rentals
 - Adult Sports Leagues
 - Ticketed Community Events

Mostly cost recovery (51% – 80%); Partial subsidy





- 4. & 5. CONSIDERABLE INDIVIDUAL BENEFIT/ MOSTLY INDIVIDUAL BENEFIT: Individuals or groups benefit from the services; there is little or no community benefit.
 - Picnic Shelter Rentals
 - Private facility rentals
 - Concessions
 - Non-Resident, Private or For-Profit Athletic Field Rentals
 - Public Private Partnerships (ASC)
- 80% 100% cost recovery; Enterprise fund



- Direct costs are those specific expenses, which are incurred by the department in conducting a program or operating a facility. These are costs associated with the customers' or users' direct experience.
- Indirect costs are those department expenses, which are not directly incurred by the program or facility but may be charged to it.

Direct Costs Indirect Cost

- Utilities Water, Sewer, other Electrical/Lighting, Air Conditioning, etc.
- Maintenance seed, fertilizer, set up, clean up
- Capital Replacement
- Administrative Support Staff
- Computer Registration Software
- Security



- Determine the direct and indirect costs of providing the services.
- 2. Utilize the Pyramid methodology to determine what category the service being offered will align based on each community.
- 3. Identify the market rate or current fee being charged for similar services.
- 4. Budgetary mandates that may affect the fee/charge setting process.
- 5. Fees shall be set to improve cost recovery, but not to significantly impact a user group's ability to pay.
- 6. For profit user groups and non-residents pay higher fees.


